

PROVIDING SHELTER AND DIRECT CARE FOR HOMELESS, NEGLECTED, INJURED OR ABANDONED FARMED ANIMALS

Imagine being lost, alone, injured and without a friend in sight. Sadly, that has been the case for many of the animals who have found sanctuary and salvation through Edgar's Mission. And it only happened because kindness found them: kindness in the form of the human heart who witnessed an animal in trouble and knew that what they chose to do next could save a life. Many of the animals who arrive at Edgar's Mission

are suffering from the effects of neglect
- malnutrition, starvation, or untreated
wounds and injuries - and an animal
protection system that views these sentient
beings as production units. Our task is to
provide medical treatment, nourishment,
reassurance and comfort in the form of
shelter, companions and kindness.
With over 450 animals, it's a big task.





ANIMAL CARE AND WELFARE

Our pledge to every animal who passes through our sanctuary gates is to give them a life truly worth living, and when we can no longer do this, to help them pass peacefully, and with kindness, from this world.

For our **450-plus residents**, this means ensuring all have comfortable shelter, along with good nutrition, first-class animal husbandry, veterinary care and, of course, friends to share the sunshine with. Yet some animals require even more, having special and complex needs that call upon an even higher standard of care and resourcefulness.

A normal day at the sanctuary often **begins well before dawn.** Sometimes it began the previous day, if we have spent the night caring for an orphaned infant, elderly weakened ewe or the victim of neglect who has required monitoring throughout the night. Sometimes we may have received a call long after the sun went down to render assistance for an animal in urgent need. Whatever has happened overnight, each morning, sanctuary work beckons.

We have a **small staff of dedicated individuals** who meet early in the day to talk through the coming day's activities. We discuss the tasks that lie ahead and what the day will look like, taking note of **special needs animals** and specific duties required around the sanctuary, bearing in mind the ever-present need to be flexible, adaptable and accommodating of change, as this so often occurs.

We have a **small hospital centre** in our main barn; here we provide basic veterinary care as needed. All animals upon arrival undergo **health checks and assessment**, which includes checking vital signs, temperature and weight; implementing parasite control; and biosecurity as needed. **Rehabilitation programs are tailored** for each individual animal depending on their specific needs, be they physical or psychological – sadly many arrive frightened and with a well-earned distrust of humans.

Our barn also houses many of our special-needs residents overnight: those who are elderly, vulnerable, sickly or very young. Whether they are a chicken who is off-colour or a sheep who needs her prosthetics removed overnight, a warm and snug vet cage or straw-filled stall awaits. Most of our barn flock get to spend their days in the sun, escorted each day to the right paddock - a simple enough task with a recovering duck, but more challenging when it's

a feisty pig or a recently castrated ram who needs to be gently directed to the right destination!

It is well and truly part of our daily work to fit our special needs sheep **Charity, Lemonade, Jewell and Shy with their prosthetics** before they head out from their safe night quarters to explore the big wide world of their pasture. Every day it **never fails to make us smile** watching these beloved residents march out to their paddock, each requesting a Weet-Bix for their efforts at the end of the journey. **Their resilience is truly inspirational!**

Every animal is checked daily, and for some members of our Edgar's Mission family, this includes twice-daily feeding. This means loading up vehicles with grain, pellets, greens, vegetables and whatever else is needed to keep them all happy and healthy. Our rabbits and birds have their houses cleaned daily (our feathered friends boast a community of 15 houses). Our pigs have their paddocks cleaned and their bedding refreshed. Our goats, cows, alpacas and horses have their paddocks and sleeping quarters checked, and of course we greet and review the health of everyone each day. All water troughs are checked and refreshed as needed to maintain our exacting standards of hygiene. While volunteers are often on hand to help, the bulk of our work must be undertaken by our small team of dedicated sanctuary hands.

Apart from direct animal care, there is maintenance of our internal roadways, enclosures, pathways, trees, pastures, shedding, fences and buildings; ensuring a safe workplace for our staff and volunteers; mitigating against possible fire and flood; promoting our merchandise to help support our work; managing open days and tours; and of course staying in touch with our friends and supporters through social media channels and email and ensuring our special message of kindness for animals reaches the widest audience possible.

HIP HOP BOB

Hip Hop Bob was born at the sanctuary - her mother was Eliza, a recent rescue. Early on, she won a place in the heart of our Operations Manager, Kyle Behrend, himself only recently arrived at the sanctuary. When Hip Hop became ill, we left no stone unturned to get Hip Hop back on her dainty trotters. She had a CT scan the day the debilitating pressure on her spine was detected, followed by emergency spinal surgery, followed by daily static rehabilitation and physio sessions. An incredibly kind-hearted supporter made a donation that helped Hip Hop take her first steps following surgery - a hydraulic lifting machine. Under the expert supervision of our rehabilitation team, a unique sling system safely suspended Hip Hop as she began to relearn the art of walking, under the watchful eye of Kyle.

Friends will be aware that our much-loved Hip Hop died suddenly and unexpectedly 2018. She remains in our hearts and a special memorial to her is planned at the sanctuary.



TOGETHER

Having arrived into our care in June after experiencing a horrific dog attack, it has been a long road to recovery for Together. Daily management has seen us able to gradually heal many of Together's injuries, which included one ear having been completely torn off, another partly removed, a fracture to the delicate bone surrounding her eye, and multiple bite wounds, one of which came frighteningly close to claiming her vision. While she has not welcomed her daily eye baths and ointment, Together no longer trembles at our touch, nor does she now fight to escape us. She has made friends with our shy angora goat Silver, who is recovering from traumatic injury to a horn. Both are recuperating under the admiring eyes of our volunteers, who stop by on their cleaning rounds to check in on the recovering duo.



MARGERY AND MALCOLM

Margery, a saintly and elderly ewe, had recently given birth to her lamb in a country pound. Sadly, overnight a fox claimed the life of this precious baby. She was distraught when she arrived at our sanctuary not long thereafter. **She desperately wanted to be a mother.** Meanwhile, Malcolm, a two-day-old lamb, had watched on as his mother slipped from this world. Although losing the one he cherished most, he did not lose his will to live. **He desperately needed a mother.**

In finding sanctuary at Edgar's Mission, both of these hapless animals found something so much more they found each other.

Adopting Malcolm as her own, Margery is both proud and now fulfilled, and little Malcolm, well, the wee chap is over the moon! So often in life, it is through finding sanctuary in the company of others that we truly find ourselves.




HOW NOW

When she arrived in February, little How Now's condition tore at our hearts. She had been dumped, severely emaciated, burdened with fowl pox, and as if this wasn't enough of a tragedy to befall this gentle hen, x-rays were to reveal sharp nails had been ingested and embedded in her gizzard along with a severe trauma to her leg causing a debilitating fracture. How Now's resilience was amazing; finding hope in the most hopeless of situations, she began to rally as we treated her ailments, and despite all of the adversity she had suffered, she survived and thrived for several months. Sadly, we were to discover that multiple tumours had coursed through her intestines and liver. Her condition is one that repeatedly claims the lives of so many hens purposely bred for exponential egg production a malady our society must be made aware of.

SOME FAVOURITES

We don't play favourites here at Edgar's Mission, but we know that some of our residents have fans all over the globe. Here's a recap on the stories of Ruby, Stitch and Steady Eddie.



VET NURSE RUBY

Ruby's dearest friends are Pam and Kyle, but she has love to share with everyone who arrives at the sanctuary. **She is an expert 'meeter and greeter',** making sure to welcome every person and animal who steps foot on Edgar's Mission!

Bred to be a working dog, Ruby's life seemed doomed when the farmer decided she was useless and no longer worth keeping. But the man who the farmer asked to shoot Ruby just couldn't do it – instead he chose kindness and with just one call Ruby's life was spared and she was on her way to fulfilling her destiny. She arrived at Edgar's Mission a frightened and thin little waif of a dog, whose own shadow caused her great angst. But that was way back in 2009, and time really does heal wounds; Ruby's happy-go-lucky disposition and equally happy-go-lucky tongue have had her a firm favourite with all she meets. It is almost as if Ruby wants to share her good fortune with everyone, and we all are certainly the better for that.



STEADY EDDIE

Eddie arrived in 2016, a wee kid goat rescued after being abandoned in open parklands. Born with a congenital condition that means he is unable to synthesise thiamine (which is needed for normal nervous system and muscle functioning), Eddie couldn't balance or walk properly.

And so we began intensive treatment. Nearly two years later, his gait is still odd, as are his teeth, but this sociable and curious chap now has the run of the sanctuary and all of the hearts he meets. Eddie repeatedly uses his charm to try to attract treats from everyone who passes by!



VET NURSE STITCH

Little Stitch is a **very much-loved kitty** who spends most of her days hanging around our main barn, sharing her love with volunteers, staff, visitors, animal residents ... in fact, everyone who crosses her path. She was one of four kittens (and their mother) rescued by the Edgar's Mission team from an industrial estate where their lives were very much in peril.



FINDING PERMANENT HOMES FOR MISTREATED AND ABANDONED ANIMALS AND PROMOTING ADOPTION THROUGH EDUCATION AND EXAMPLE

Our picturesque sanctuary in Lancefield (in Victoria, Australia) is currently home sweet home to over 450 fortunate individuals. Each day we respond to countless calls for assistance for animals in need. Sometimes we are able to help with advice and support; sometimes we direct the caller to our farmed animal friends adoption page; sometimes we must act quickly to save a life. The simple logistics of 153 acres of land and only 24 hours in a day

means we simply cannot provide a lifelong home to every animal we are contacted about. So, where possible, we find amazing, loving and safe homes for our rescued animals. Thank you to our wonderful network of carers who provide permanent homes and care to so many animals we have taken into our hearts and sanctuary, ensuring that our lifesaving and life-changing work can continue.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Over the years we have been truly blessed to find kind hearts and welcome pastures for many of our rescued farmed animal friends. Here are some of their stories.

MISS REDDY. FELICIA AND EDEN

When they came out of the van into the small paddock that would be their home until they settled in, I wondered how I would tell them apart. That seems so silly now, in looks and personality they are so different. The youngsters, Miss Reddy, sweet, gentle somewhat shy but growing in confidence daily and Eden, in your face, adventurous and a comedian. Then there is Felicia, she is like that favourite Aunty. She does get a bit left behind by the youngsters, I think they wake up earlier than her and now they have free range of the whole property that includes four acres of tall trees, they are off! - Jan, who adopted a trio of sheep from Edgar's Mission. CUSTARD

Custard was a foal left orphaned almost two years ago when she was taken from her mother, in order for the sweet dam to raise a more 'valuable' thoroughbred foal. In taking Custard in we were able to save her life, but we knew our time together would be short lived as **we were able to secure a forever, safe and loving home for her.** We had the great pleasure to catch up with Custard this year at her home. She has grown into a beautiful, cheeky girl in the loving care of Horse Shepherd Equine Sanctuary - Horse Rescue and Rehabilitation.

IS RUNNING AN ANIMAL SANCTUARY YOUR CALLING?

'I want to start an animal sanctuary, can you tell me how?'

It is a question we have heard so very often over the years. It is for this very reason our **'Kind Critter Conference'** came into being. In June 2017, we staged our fourth year of the conference, with participants flying in from all over Australia. For many, it was the lowdown on starting a sanctuary that helped; for others, it was learning how to better to care for rescued farmed animals; yet others benefitted from spending time with like-minded individuals. **And once again the feedback was overwhelmingly positive.**

The conference provides an insight into the many complexities of running a farm sanctuary, to enhance the knowledge of those who currently care for farmed animals or those wishing to take on rescued farmed animals. We discuss skills needed to start a sanctuary, sanctuary administration, animal care, husbandry and handling, dealing with burnout, farm/shelter design, emergency planning and more. Our recent guest presenter was founder and head honcho at one of Australia's first ever sanctuaries for rescued farmed animals, Bede Carmody, who runs A Poultry Place in Murrumbateman, New South Wales. Thank you Bede, and everyone who attended.

TOURS AND EVENTS

This year we welcomed **more than 6500+ people to the sanctuary** through our free and private tours; we welcomed school groups as well as Probus clubs and community organisations.

SCHOOLS EDUCATION



OPEN DAYS


Through our open days, 1700+ people were welcomed through our sanctuary gates and into the magic of Edgar's Mission. Foundation Day, also known as 'Found Edgar Day', celebrated the 16 years since Edgar Alan Pig trotted into Pam's heart — it was a great success. We also hosted World Kindness Day in November, another sold-out event, with animal groups and cruelty-free traders, plant-based foods, inspirational speakers, and more! On Mothers' Day, our 'Picnic in the Paddock', catered by Chef Zachary Bird, rejoiced the love and care of and for all mothers, including our very own Clarabelle Cow and Carole Pig.



COOKING WITH KINDNESS

'ASK ME WHY I'M KIND'

If you live in Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane or Perth, you may have been asking this question – prompted by a flashy billboard, a colourful poster or thought-provoking leaflet with a handsome pig named Max centre stage alongside the words, 'Ask me why I'm kind to animals like Max'.

A 2018 crowd-funding campaign raised just over \$100,000. It asks Australians why, as a nation of animal lovers, we let animals sit at the periphery of not only our animal protection legislation but our thoughts and kindness as well. It aims to change that by getting people to consider why kindness is important to farmed animals like the affable Max. The campaign includes a dedicated website www.askmewhy.com.au, billboards, posters, postcards, mugs, notebooks, stickers, bags and t-shirts.

We plan future campaigns centring on dairy cows and poultry.

WALKING THE WALK, AND TALKING THE TALK

'Think of the power of words,' once said Swami Vivekananda. With the power of her words and her heart, Edgar's Mission Founder and Director, Pam Ahern, delivered many moving talks, presentations and written pieces in 2018–19.

'So often we hear that animal activists are the worst nightmares of the meat and livestock industries, but I don't believe this to be correct. And it is not whistle-blowers or disgruntled workers coming forward who will bring these industries to their knees. Despite the impacts both of these groups have on the industries who profit from animals, the two most formidable foes are both meeker and a little closer to home—the animals themselves and the goodness of the human heart. After all, who best to argue the case of a sheep than a sheep—the same for a chicken, fish, rabbit, pig, cow or goat? And who better to hear that plea for mercy than a kind heart?' – extract, speech for Melbourne Sheep Save Rally, January 2019




SUBMISSIONS TO GOVERNMENT

Campaigning on behalf of farmed animals is undertaken on three fronts through the work of Edgar's Mission: through the direct rescue of animals in need; through sanctuary visits, outreach programs and public speaking; and through working for legislative change. In the recent past Edgar's Mission researched, prepared and presented petitions in relation to intensive animal production, the NSW government inquiry into battery hen cages, the RSPCA, a planned intensive piggery at Matong, NSW, along with our continued work to seek exemption for ear tagging for farmed animals.

'Edgar's Mission supports the view expressed by leading emeritus professor of animal welfare at Cambridge University, Donald Broom – "Any breeding that can be predicted to result in poor welfare should be illegal". Breeding hens for exponential egg production has been shown to have deleterious effects on hens. This is evidenced by their short "productive" life. Hens beyond the age of two years are considered "spent" by industry, yet their wild cousins can live for 10 to 12 years.' – extract, submission to NSW government inquiry into battery hen cages

'As a compassionate and aware society we must consider that as history has demonstrated over and over again, just because something is legal, doesn't make it moral, ethical or right. Humanity dictates we all have a moral obligation to challenge injustice and societal wrongs and shape who we are as a society. Our leaders and decision makers, including local government councils, have a clear responsibility to listen, question and act in this regard... The world contains around one billion domesticated pigs and the majority are confined in intensive agriculture. The pigs are commodities in a factory environment with a focus on profit, not animal welfare, wellbeing or sentience.' - extract, submission to Wagga Wagga Shire Council regarding a planned intensive piggery at Matong, May 2019

FUNDING FOR THE FUTURE

In accordance with principles of good governance, we maintain an operating reserve to ensure the ongoing viability of the sanctuary. This includes a dedicated pool of protected funds to support the day-to-day operations of Edgar's Mission in the event of unforeseen shortfalls. The reserve may also be used for one-time, non-recurring expenses that will build long-term capacity, such as investment in land or infrastructure. On an annual basis, the Board reviews risk exposure and the resulting impact on operating reserve levels.

A NEV SHEARING SHED

With our sheep family sitting shy of 200 animals, shearing, crutching, drenching, hoof trimming, and vaccination time presents us with many logistically challenging and labour-intensive hours.

A dedicated shed will offer a most welcome additional facility for our animal husbandry team. We are working to ensure the coming year will make this a reality. Estimated cost \$40,000 - \$50,000



FUNDRAISING

Fundraising is absolutely key to our survival. We receive no funding from government and depend on donations from members of the public. All donations to Edgar's Mission in Australia are tax-deductible. Among our fundraising initiatives are Five Dollar Friday and Trek for Kindness.



FIVE DOLLAR FRIDAY

We launched Five Dollar Friday in February 2018 and have been overwhelmed by the response. We are tremendously grateful to our supporters who contribute to our medical fund, sometimes enabling treatments that perhaps no other farmed animal in Australia has undergone.

We have more than 700 Five Dollar Friday donors (some as weekly, some as monthly). We recently set up PayPal as an option for recurring payments, which is very helpful for overseas donors.


